SURVIVAL BY THE NUMBERS

- The Black Death killed 75 million to 200 million people. This was 30 to 60 percent of Europe's people.
- In some villages, 80 to 90 percent of their populations died.
- The Black Death reduced the world's population in the 14th century from 475 million to 350 million people.
- At its worst, about 800 dead bodies were buried per day. On average, 20 to 60 bodies were buried daily.
 Many bodies were buried in the same pit.
- It took 300 to 400 years for population numbers to recover after the Black Death.
- The World Health Organization is in charge of public health. It states there are still 1,000 to 3,000 cases of plague every year.
- After infection, it takes 2 to 6 days for a bubonic plague victim to be sick.
- Without treatment, the bubonic plague kills up to 60 percent of victims.
- Over 80 percent of U.S. plague cases are bubonic plague. An average of 7 cases are reported per year.
